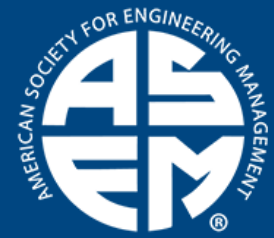

ASEM Founder's Award for Best Student Chapter

Nominations Due 15 May 2016

ASEM invites Student Chapters to apply for the Founder's Award to recognize active student chapters. The application should be sent to ASEM headquarters by e-mail at asem-hq@asem.org. The last date to receive completed applications from chapters is **15 May 2016**.

There are 9 criteria which will be used to judge the applications for the Founder's Award – Student Section. Each criterion will be rated on a score from 1 to 10 with 10 being highest. The number shown in parenthesis provides the weighting of this criterion.

1. Nomination Packet Preparation (5%) – It is the intent that the students (with the help of their faculty advisor) will prepare the nomination packet. Packets prepared solely by the faculty advisor will not receive full points in this criterion.
2. Quality of Submission (25%) – Nomination packets should be prepared such that they are complete, comprehensive, easy to read and interpret, interesting, and visually aesthetic. It is a good idea to include photos documenting student chapter activities. Do not make the judges dig for this information within your report, but make sure that it is clearly marked.
3. Active Student Participation (25%) – Provide documentation to describe active student participation in the chapter to include things such as the number of student members, attendance at meetings, training sessions and field trips, etc. Also describe the student chapter leadership and list chapter officers.
4. ASEM Conference Participation (10%) – Identify the number of students attending the annual conference or other regional conferences. List things like the number of papers presented, participation in student competitions and nominations for the best Ph.D. dissertation award.
5. Engineering Management Projects (10%) – Describe any engineering management projects completed as part of the student chapter. For example this could be participation in a student simulation or facility layout competition.
6. Community Projects (5%) – Describe any community projects completed as part of the student chapter that supports the community such as providing an engineering management solution to assist a women's shelter or to assist with developing a bus schedule for a school district.
7. Faculty Involvement (5%) – Describe the number and extent of involvement of the student chapter faculty advisor as well as other faculty within the department to ASEM.
8. Support for the Engineering Management Profession (5%) – Document how the student chapter supports the engineering management profession such as assistance with recruiting students into the engineering management program of study.
9. EM Practice (10%) - Contributions to engineering management practice (number of conference papers, number of journal articles).

Upcoming ASEM Executive Director

ASEM Announces the Academic Partnership Program

Many academic departments and programs have expressed a need to coordinate membership enrollment of large numbers of students related to activities such as student chapters or class activities. As a result, student membership registration can be complicated. The primary issues often involve university financial policies and difficulty in collecting checks and similar logistics. To facilitate this process, ASEM has developed the “Academic Partnership Program” to simplify larger volumes of student membership registrations and related funds management. The primary goals for this program are to help with the administrative burden at the local university and facilitate the registration process for students to join ASEM.

How It Works

Based on a fixed fee, the program allows an academic institution to facilitate a given number of individual student memberships on a large scale with minimal paperwork. Upon joining the program, the institution or the lead faculty member is issued an access code which allows the specified number of students to go directly to the ASEM web site and register as student members. They enjoy the benefits of membership such as receiving electronic copies of the society’s publications (the Engineering Management Journal, the practice periodical, and eNews), and enjoying reduced conference registration, and participation in society webinars. Most important, costs can be reduced due to economies of scale and local dues can be retained locally to support student activities. Here are the current levels and they represent significant savings:

Academic Partnership Levels:

- Level 1 Academic Partnership: Up to 25 students \$500
- Level 2 Academic Partnership: Up to 50 students \$1,000
- Level 3 Academic Partnership: Unlimited students \$2,000
